

DR. HULLIHEN DIED
ON SUNDAY MORNING

Infirmities of Age Claim Beloved Churchman and Gallant Soldier in His 83d Year; Was on Staff of General J. E. B. Stuart; Twice Wounded; Was Ordained in 1837; Came Here in 1872.

Scores of friends, the Ministerial Association of Staunton, ministers of other cities, the congregations of Trinity and Emmanuel churches, and comrades of the Civil war will attend the funeral of the late Dr. Walter Quaker Hullihen, who died Sunday morning at his late residence, 557 Middlebrook avenue, from infirmities incident to his advanced years, which will be held this afternoon at 5 o'clock from Trinity Episcopal church, of which he was the faithful and beloved rector for nearly half a century.

Dr. Hullihen was a faithful, God-serving man. He was loved by hosts of friends. A gallant veteran of the Civil war, Staunton as a whole mourns the loss of this great Christian worker and brave warrior.

Burial in Trinity Yard

Burial will be in the vestment of a minister of the Episcopal church by his own request, he having left a note asking that this be done, and, by action of the vestry of the church at a special meeting Monday morning, in the yard of the church. No burials have been authorized in the church yard for many years, but in view of Dr. Hullihen's long and faithful service and his great love for Trinity the vestry voted to not a lot at the disposal of the family.

Bishop Robert Carter, who was Dr. Hullihen's colleague here for 23 years as rector of Emmanuel, the Rev. John J. Orvatt Jr., present rector of Trinity, and the Rev. J. Lewis Gibbs, rector of Emmanuel, will conduct the services.

Guests attending in a body include Stonewall Jackson camp, Confederate Veterans, J. E. B. Stuart chapter, U. D. C., and the Ministerial Association of Staunton. Active pall bearers will be men of Trinity who were members of the vestry at the time of his retirement as rector in 1915, and honorary bearers will be other members of the present vestry, as follows:

Dr. Hullihen, he survived by his wife, who was Miss Amelia H. Campbell of Wheeling, to whom he was married March 21, 1879, and the following children: Miss Elizabeth Hullihen, at home; Mrs. Lewis Rautenberg, Washington, D. C.; Dr. Walter Hullihen, president of Delaware university; Mrs. Jas. J. Marshall, Fauquier county, and Mrs. C. E. A. Marshall, at home.

Notable Career

Dr. Hullihen had a career that was notable for its consecration to duty, usefulness, and service to God and country. He was born in Wheeling, W. Va., then Virginia, June 14, 1841, the fourth son of Dr. S. P. Hullihen and Elizabeth Finckeburg Hullihen of Wheeling.

At the opening of the Civil war, he was a student at the University of Virginia. He took part in the Harpers Ferry expedition with other student volunteers, in a company which called itself the "Sons of Liberty." His name does not appear on the roll of the company, as he went to Harpers Ferry as a substitute.
